





The biographies of Jews under Muslim rule have often been characterized by great – voluntary or involuntary – mobility. This dispersal facilitated the exchange of ideas, languages, and cultural practices, contributing to the rich tapestry of Jewish history and the development of distinct Jewish communities in various locations.

But what has not yet received sufficient attention in research are the unforseen effects that border-crossings - cultural, geographical, political - have on the traveler's making sense of the respectively local order of things on a variety of levels: hermeneutics, institutions, values, symbols, ideas etc. As a result of this creative tension or conflict between what they bring in and what they encounter on site their understanding of whole books can undergo fundamental transformations - occasionally abrupt and even downright illogical.

This awareness and focus on local dynamics between both transgression and some kind of local order enables historiography to free itself from eurocentric, monolithic concepts such as "culture", "tradition", "enlightenment", "secularization", "pre-modernity" or "modernity" which become dispensable in favor of more fluid models of cultural encounter.
